Or do you think of the gentle face on that holy card, with eyes filled with so much power and conviction that, with a look and a word, he could get people to drop everything and follow him?


Whatever image you have of Jesus, there's no doubt that this man—a man with no worldly wealth or standing—had more of an impact on human history than any other before or since.

When I was in high school, I went to a rock concert where the band de Talk was performing. There was a guy with a T-shirt that said, "Jesus Freak" across the from. At one point in the concert, he stood up and I was able to read the back of his T-shirt, which said,

"What will people think when they hear that I'm a Jesus Freak?
What will people do when they find that it's true?

at that concert, I started asking myself some hard questions about what I believed and how I acted, and it changed the way I lived.


My heart was opened to a new lifestyle, a new worldview, I didn't want God to be just someone I prayed to when things got tough or when I needed something. From that night on, I realized that Jesus Christ was as real to me, here and now as he was to the apostles who, walked with him 2,000 years ago. He was their Savior and Redeemer, but also their friend.

You might say the early disciples and martyrs were "Jesus Freaks," They went to the ends of the earth and to their deaths proclaiming the Euth of Jesus Christ's love and forgiveness. They wanted everyone to have that intimate relationship with Jesus. The Jesus Freaks of today are doing the same

thing, and I want it to be said of me as well, "I don't really care if they label me a Jesus Freak ... There ain't no disguising the truth."

When Jesus becomes Lord and King of our hearts, it affects every aspect of our lives—what we watch or TV, what music we listen to, who our friends are. When I gave my life to Jesus—wholly and entirely—it was scary; I thought I might lose myself. But

what I found was that he gave me so much more in return. I feared that giving everything to Jesus might make me "miss out" on life; but when I did give my whole life to Jesus, I experienced all that I had been missing. All I can say is the "mch" I gave him is nothing compared to the "mile" he gave me. We just cannot outdo God in generosity.

### St. Teresa of Avila

#### Sometimes when we think of the saints, we wonder how we could ever be like them.

We think of them as heroic men and women who suffered terrible marryrdoms or who lived such lives of piety and HOLINESS that we could never follow in their footsteps.

Enter St. Teresa of Avila, a mystic and doctor of the Church who lived in the sixteenth century. She had a quick wit and a quicker tongue. Once, when she was rushing to the side of a sick friend, she got halfway across a river and fell off her horse. Shaken and soaking wet, she railed at God, "If this is the way you treat your friends, it's no wonder you have so few!"

Far from being a model of unautainable holiness, Teresa struggled with prayer and in her relationships with other people. Although she loved Jesus beyond measure, she just wasn't attracted to religious life as it was practiced in her day the convents were full of spoiled young women who didn't want to be tied down by the demands of family life.

As a child, Teresa had looked for a quick way to holiness, running away from home with her little brother to fight the Moors so they could be martyred. Instead,

God called her to a "living martyrdom"—leading the reform of the Carmelite order. She endured great suffering both physically, with illness that struck her throughout her life, and emotionally, with resistance to her reforms from within her own community of sisters.

St. Teresa wrote several books on the spiritual life and about her mystical experiences. She taught her Carmelite sisters how to deepen their prayer lives in order to grow closer to the Savior. Her best-known work is *The Interior Castle*, a study of spirituality and contemplative prayer.

Although she lived a life of sacrifice and suffering, it was not without the joy of beautiful spiritual friendships, notably with another saint and doctor of the Church, St. John of the Cross. She valued friendship as a way for people to build each other up toward heaven and toward the true friendship, which is the friendship with Christ.

St. Teresa, pray for us. Help us to really know and love Jesus as you did.

#### Wrap-Up

Who was Jesus of Nazareth? This question has been debated ever since Jesus and his apostles walked the earth. In the Gospel of Mark, Jesus asks his followers, "Who do men say that I am?" (Mark 8:27). Here's how they responded:

"And they told him, 'John the Baptist; and others say, Elijah; and others one of the prophets.' And he asked them, 'But who do you say that 1 am?' Peter answered him, 'You are the Christ'" (Mark 8:28-29).

How would you have answered Jesus? Some people like to brush Jesus aside, saying he was a great prophet or a wise man. But what would you think if someone came up to you and claimed to be God? Would you conclude he was the wisest person who ever lived? More likely, you'd think he was either kidding around or was delusional. A liar or a lunatic.

Jesus couldn't have been a liar. Liars lie to get something they want. No one dies a horrible death to perpetuate a falsehood. To teach with the wisdom and clarity that he did, Jesus couldn't have been crazy, either.

Jesus claimed to be God—and rose from the dead to prove it, something no other founder of a world religion has ever done. He was not a liar and not a lunatic ... but Lord.<sup>2</sup>



### Did You Know?

In the sixth century, many people said, "Good luck to you," if someone sneezed. Pope St. Gregory the Great began the practice of saying, "God bless you," as a protection from the plague ravaging Italy at the time.

#### "What's That Word?"

#### FIAT

Latin for "let it be done," this term refers to Mary's acceptance of the ANGEL Gabriel's words informing her that she would be the Mother of the Son of God. It is clear from the biblical account of the Annunciation in Luke 1:26-38 that Mary initially did not understand the angel Gabriel's words—"How can this be, since I have no husband?"—yet her unshakeable faith in God gave her the strength to say "yes" despite her lack of understanding. Mary's example of faith presents us with a model to follow in our own lives, showing us that we don't always need to understand God's will. We just need to follow it.

#### INCARNATION

If you like Mexican food, you've heard of *carne asada*. The Spanish word *carne* ("meat") comes from the Latin *caro/carnis*, meaning "flesh." So the *Incarnation* refers to God coming in the flesh when the second Person of the Trinity, the Son, took on a human nature (i.e., a human body and a human soul) when he was conceived by the Holy Spirit in the womb of the Blessed Virgin MARY. He became truly man, yet remained truly God. He is 100 percent God and 100 percent human, not "part God and part human."

#### **JESUS CHRIST**

The second Person of the Trinity, Jesus Christ, is God incarnate. The name "Jesus" comes from the Hebrew Yeshua, meaning "God saves." The angel Gabriel told Joseph to give Jesus this name because "he will save his people from their sins" (Matthew 1:21). "Christ" was not Jesus' last name. It comes from *Christos* in ancient Greek, which means, "anointed one." (In Hebrew, the word is Messiah.)

In Scripture, to be anointed is to be empowered by God for a specific role and task. In Baptism and Confirmation, the Holy Spirit anoints us when our heads are marked with sacred chrism (holy oil). In union with Jesus, we are empowered to live as children who serve our heavenly Father.

#### **PASCHAL MYSTERY**

The PASCHAL MYSTERY is Jesus' Passion (suffering), Death, Resurrection from the dead, and Ascension into heaven. The word paschal comes from the Hebrew for Passover.

The Passover commemorates the Exodus, when God, through Moses, commanded the Hebrew people, then slaves of the Egyptians, to sacrifice a lamb and mark their doors with its blood. That night, the firstborn in every home in Egypt died—except those in homes with blood spattered on their doorways. This was the event that pushed Pharaoh to finally free God's people from slavery.

By the Paschal Mystery, Jesus, who is called the sacrificial "Lamb of God," is sacrificed for us all. He doesn't free us from an earthly ruler, but from our slavery to sin and death.

## How do you know he really rose from the dead?

Nothing supports a case like an eyewitness. In the nineteenth century, Harvard law professor Dr. Simon Greenleaf set out to prove that Jesus' Resurrection would never hold up in a court of law. Instead, he became a Christian! He was convinced by the large number of eyewitnesses to Jesus' Resurrection (including most of the apostles), who were willing to die rather than recant their testimony.\*

#### Why did Jesus come to us?

The Catechism lists four reasons:

- 1) To remove sin and reconcile us to God
- 2) To show us just how much God loves us
- 3) To show us how to live
- 4) To fill us with his divine life (see also CCC 456-460)

While people of various beliefs have died for an *idea*, the apostles staked their lives on the truth of their eventuess assimony.
