

When we awoke this morning, we found ourselves blessed with another day. It is Easter Sunday. As that thought crossed our minds, did we find ourselves saying, "so what" or "alleluia?" For many, today is truly a day of alleluia. For others, it is just another day of "so what." Faith makes a huge difference. It not only makes a difference in how we understand today and its significance, but it also makes a massive difference in how we understand ourselves.

Succeed, live well, be productive, find your niche, follow your dreams, make money, protect your social status, be politically correct, and pursue your passions are good examples of the messages our secular culture wants us to hear. In and of themselves, they don't sound all that harmful. But, when examined, they are. The life of resurrection embodied in the Gospel tells a much different story.

Life keeps us busy. We are always connected, distracted, occupied, and working. For many of us, an agenda awaits us before we even start our day, and unfinished stuff is brought with us when we retire at night. Making the best of life and finding your road to happiness are messages we all too easily believe.

The "so what" response to the new life of resurrection often results from believing that life is only what I make it. What God has to say isn't all that important as I seek to secure my next pay raise. Sadly, we live as if the grave is the end. While we may give the wonder of heaven a blink now and then, its glory doesn't impress us or matter all that much. It's all about the here and now and what I need to do today to get where I want to be tomorrow. We tend to put off considering the one significant "tomorrow" that will come the millisecond after I take my last breath. When that happens, will we want to be thinking, "so what" or "alleluia?"

There is only one Jesus, one mission, and one resurrection. There is also only one of us. Have you ever pondered what one solitary, humble human life can do? Faith, not our world, tells us how special we are. We are not robots. We are not replaceable. We have one shot. There are no do-overs. Love is at our core and unites us with the God of love who so desperately wants us to be with him forever. Easter in the Roman Catholic Church is always on the first Sunday after the first full moon after the spring equinox.

Easter eggs, also called Paschal eggs, are decorated and used as gifts on the occasion of Easter. The oldest tradition uses dyed and painted chicken eggs. A more modern custom is to substitute chocolate eggs wrapped in colored foil, hand-carved wooden eggs, or plastic eggs filled with confectionery, such as chocolate.



However, real eggs continue to be used in Central and Eastern European Christian traditions to celebrate the Eastertide. Christians see the egg as a symbol of resurrection: the egg contains a new life sealed within. In addition, one ancient tradition was the staining of Easter eggs with red "in memory of the blood of Christ, shed at the time of his crucifixion."

In the Orthodox churches, priests bless Easter eggs at the end of the Paschal Vigil, equivalent to Holy Saturday. Eggs are then distributed to the faithful. Similarly, in the Roman Catholic Church in Poland, the so-called święconka, is the blessing of decorative baskets with a sampling of Easter eggs (pisanka) and other symbolic foods. It is one of Holy Saturday's most enduring and beloved Polish traditions.





Happy Easter to all our friends at SS. Tsidore and Maria!

Being of Polish and Russian ancestry, Father Mark knows all about the beautiful egg decorating tradition. He even colors some eggs for Easter



too! Bunnies and chicks are secular symbols of Easter, representing the beginning of spring. Thankfully, there are no bunnies at our house, Harry - just the chocolate ones in Father's basket! And we can't eat those, either!
